



Some anecdotes read at the Toronto Book Fair... - no last names used -

Muriel was put in the Home at 10 years of age when her mother was hospitalized with T.B. Her father took her and two siblings to the Home by streetcar. She was so traumatized that she has virtually no memories of what went on in the Home, only the names of some of the kids.

The reunions now offer her the opportunity to get together and hear all the reports of what did go on. She was in the Montreal Home for two years, after which time her mother was well enough to have her family reunited.

Nettie was in the Home with four siblings, from the age of 7 to 15. Her mother had died but she hadn't been to the funeral so never believed her mother was gone. She spent 8 years dreaming about searching for her.

She feels she learned her culture from the Home the Supervisors encouraged the kids to put on plays, listen to opera and the latest music.

When her father remarried, he took the kids back home.

We have been well-received by the local, mainly Jewish, press, both in Montreal and Toronto, with articles about *Four Hundred Brothers and Sisters...* Toronto & Montreal *CJNs*, Montreal's *Suburban*, two *Toronto Posts*, *The Jewish Standard*, *BBC's Tribune* and *North York Mirror*.
